Fuhrer began his career at the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, first as a research assistant, and then, in 1985 returned as a senior economist after earning his doctorate. He has been active in economic research for more than three

decades, and has served as an associate editor for the "American

consumer spending, and asset prices. Fuhrer earned an A.B. in economics with highest honors from Princeton University, and received his M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from Harvard University. He has been married for 35 years and has three grown children.

The event will also feature Mark Melnik, Ph.D. of the Donohue Institute who will focus on state wide concerns for the future of the economy including the retirement of baby boomers and retaining young, skilled workers.

Melnick specializes in demographic, socio-economic, and labor market issues. Before joining the Institute, Dr. Melnik worked as deputy director for research at the Boston Redevelopment Authority where he led research teams on demographic and economic research studies as well as analyses used for public policy advisement and decision making with the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the City of Boston. Before joining the BRA, Dr. Melnik worked as a research associate at the

Affairs

The North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce takes an active advocacy role with government on behalf of our member businesses, focused on issues that impact business and the economy of North Central Massachusetts. As part of our government relations efforts, we actively work to engage with policy makers. Below is an update on some of the more recent government relations activities at the local, regional, state and federal level.

Reaching out to candidates

The Chamber has begun to meet with the candidates for the 3rd Congressional District currently represented by Congresswoman

Tsongas. To date, we have met with Democratic candidates Dan Koh, the former chief of staff to Boston Mayor Marty Walsh; Lori Trahan, former chief of staff to Marty Meehan; state Senator Barbara L'Italian of Andover and Rufus Gifford, former ambassador to Denmark. We also sat down with Republican candidate

Rick Green, the Pepperell businessman who was the co-founder and CEO of 1A Auto. These one on one meetings are being organized in an effort to engage with the candidates about North Central Massachusetts and the priorities of the business community in the region. We will be reaching out to the other remaining candidates to schedule meetings over the next few months.

Back in the fall, the Chamber also hosted the economic development policy advisor and the district director for Congresswoman Tsongas for an economic development tour of the region which highlighted some of the projects the Chamber has supported. Chamber staff also participated in a travel and tourism tour of the 2nd Congressional District hosted by Congressman McGovern.

Chamber hosted Legislative Briefing

Prior to the special election, the Chamber staff met with all of the candidates for the Worcester & Middlesex District Senate seat formerly held by Jen Flanagan. We also recently hosted our annual



Legislative Briefing to present our economic development priorities to our legislative delegation, and engage them on efforts to shepherd those priorities through the state budget. Over the last year, we have seen more engagement with our legislative delegation, due to concerted efforts to raise the Chamber's government relations.

Engaging local leaders

Last fall, the Chamber staff met with many of the candidates for city council in Leominster and Fitchburg to engage them on priorities of the business community. Post-election, the Chamber continued its proactive outreach to newly elected public officials engaging them on the Chamber's regional priorities. The Chamber also hosted a briefing for the four new city councilors in Fitchburg with several local developers and business leaders to discuss priorities such as tax classification, tourism funding and streamlined permitting.

In recent months, the Chamber has testified at several municipal meetings, including an economic development forum in Lunenburg, a Fitchburg hearing regarding the renovations to the old City Hall building and a hearing of the Gardner City Council dealing with tourism.

In an effort to better connect the business community with local government, the Chamber is continuing to host semi-frequent meetings with local town managers. These meetings have been modeled on meetings that we hold on a monthly basis with the mayors of Fitchburg and Leominster and that serve as a forum for business and government to connect and share ideas.


