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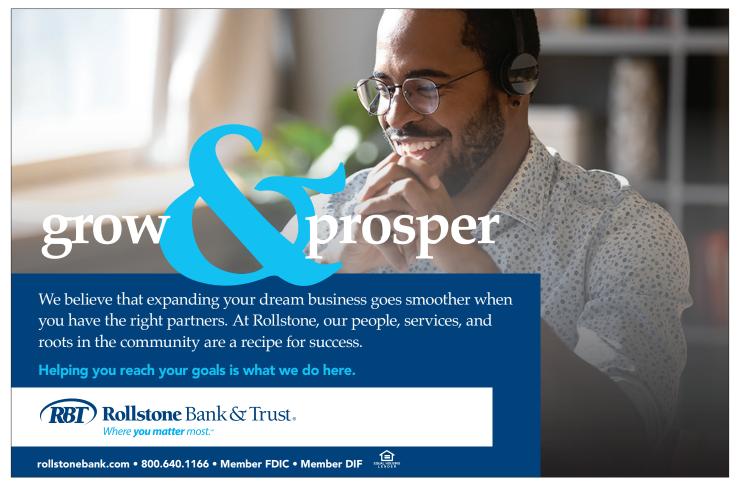

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## CHAMBER RELEASES 2021 PUBLIC POLICY AGENDA

t their September  $oldsymbol{\Lambda}$ meeting, the Chamber's Board of Directors reviewed and approved a new Public Policy Agenda for the new fiscal year that outlines the Chamber's legislative priorities on issues important to members and the advancement of North Central Massachusetts. The agenda was developed to serve as a blueprint for the Chamber's government affairs efforts with input provided from the Chamber's non-partisan Government Affairs Committee which is comprised of members from diverse industries.

"The North Central Massachusetts business community continues to face unprecedented challenges in this COVID-19 landscape. We are working closely to address the ongoing pandemic and recovery needs of the community while remaining actively engaged in important, pro-

business policy issues," said Roy Nascimento, President & CEO of the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "Our public policy agenda is focused on navigating the recovery, supporting a strong business climate and ensuring that North Central Massachusetts has access to the crucial resources it needs to remain a great place to live, work and grow a business."

The Chamber advocates on behalf of businesses across the region, and the new Public Policy Agenda outlines a platform which builds upon the area's competitive advantages while addressing this difficult time. The agenda is focused around six priority areas: novel coronavirus and economic reopening; economic competitiveness; small business; manufacturing; education; and transportation.

The Chamber is pleased to announce the participants for the 2021 Community Leadership Institute (CLI). CLI is dedicated to providing participants with individual leadership skills and a deep understanding of the region. The ninemonth program focuses on education, government, health care, social services,

justice system, media, arts and culture, environment and history. The Chamber created the Institute to inspire a new generation of men and women to enthusiastically assume important roles in their community. The program challenges individuals from diverse backgrounds to be influential in our region's future.

The Community
Leadership Institute began
in 1988, known then as
Leadership North Central.
Over the last 25 years, more
than 250 participants have
graduated from the Institute
and become leaders in
their communities, with

over 100 in the last five years. Participants for CLI are sponsored by their business and are seen as leaders or potential leaders within that company. Applications for each class are available in July and August of each year, and sessions are held once per month from October to June. To ensure the safety of all participants, sessions this year will be conducted in a hybrid format, with virtual learning and some small in-person meetings with safety protocols in place. 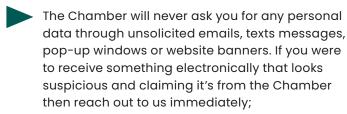

the community like the chamber of commerce.

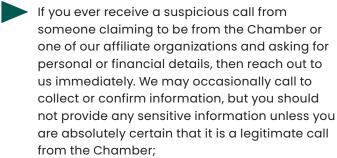
While we haven't received any specific reports, we wanted to be proactive and alert you to the following chamber practices so that you can stay vigilant and protect yourself and your business.

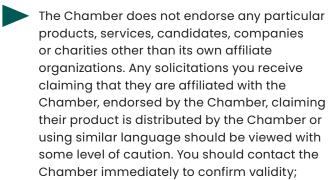

Always scrutinize unknown or suspicious emails that you receive with attachments or with requests for sensitive details or money transfers. Scammers will mask their email domains to impersonate legitimate sources. If you are suspicious about an email you receive, then you can scroll over the email address to reveal the domain. An email from the Chamber should have the domain of @northcentralmass.com. When in doubt, call to confirm the legitimacy of the email.

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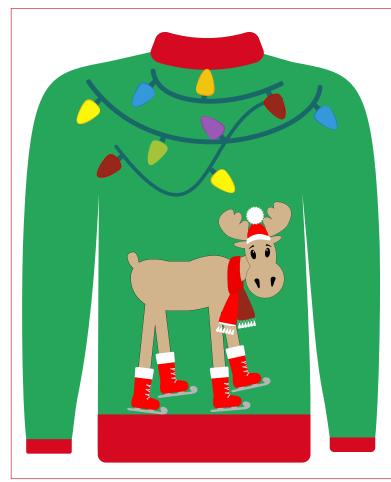

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## CHAMBER SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED IMPACTS TO BUSINESSES FROM COVID-19

Results from a business impact survey issued to businesses located in North Central Massachusetts highlight the continued impacts to the local business community due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The survey was conducted by the North Central Massachusetts Chamber in partnership with the MassHire North Central Workforce Board, the Montachusett Regional Planning Commission, NewVue Communities and many of the cities and towns in North Central Massachusetts.

Nearly 250 responses were received, representing businesses from all twentyseven cities and towns located in the region. Respondents reflected the top industries in the region

including health care, manufacturing, retail, food and beverages, financial services, education and agriculture among others.

"Our businesses have been working hard to operate safely, but the results show that many are still struggling from the economic impacts brought on by the pandemic" said Roy Nascimento, President & CEO of the North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "This survey data will be very helpful to our efforts to help support our businesses and communities as they continue to navigate the pandemic."

Nearly 64% of the businesses and organizations reported losses when compared to 2019, with nearly 25%

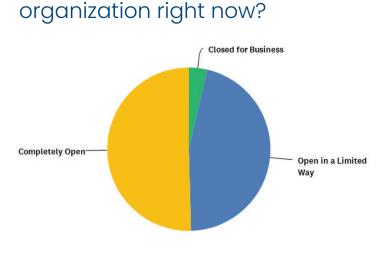
reporting losses of 50% or more. Nearly 54% reported that they expect it will be more than six months before their operations return to a normal level. Twenty-five percent of respondents estimated they could stay operational on current cash flow and reserves for six months or less. Forty-three percent of the businesses responded that they had difficulty getting employees to return to work citing health and safety concerns, child care

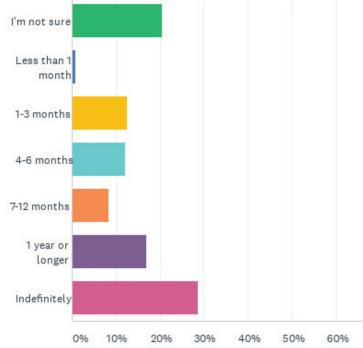
and adult care as the top reasons. Some businesses noted falling behind on rent and other bills, while the vast majority reported increased costs due to additional sanitation or shifting operations online.

Over 50% of the respondents indicated that they were completely open, while 46% indicated that they were only partially open in a limited way and the remainder were still closed due to the pandemic.

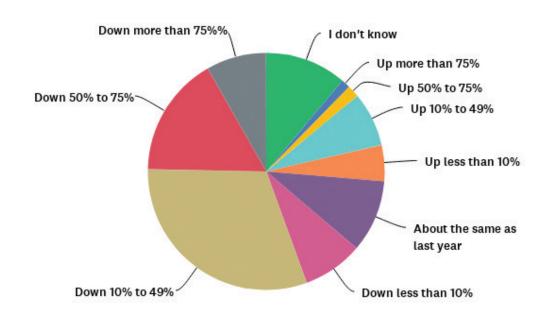
## **Q4:** How long do you estimate your business/organization can operate with your current cash flow and reserves?

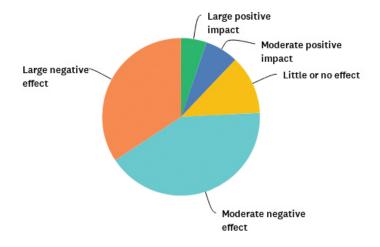
Of those closed, several cited they were closed for good while others reported that they were unsure if they would be able to reopen.

Financial programs to mitigate layoffs such as the Payroll Protection Program (PPP) was the top response when asked what businesses were using to mitigate the impact of the pandemic, followed by reduction in expenses and use of personal savings. Communications, marketing, and social media to reach their customers was the most requested resource when respondents were asked what resources,

beyond financial assistance, would be most helpful.

This survey was conducted online between October 20, 2020 and November 11, 2020 and was a follow-up to an initial survey conducted by the Chamber in March during the early days of the pandemic. The goal of the survey was to collect some fresh data and dive much deeper into the continuing impact of the pandemic to local businesses. 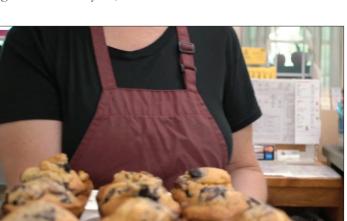
**Q5:** How would you rank the severity of the economic impacts from COVID-19 on your business/organization?

his year has placed unimaginable challenges on the North Central Massachusetts small business community. The COVID-19 pandemic created an unprecedented wave of disruption to our local economy which many are predicting will permanently alter how we make things, buy things and even where we work. The Chamber has always been a strong advocate for buying local and other initiatives that help to strengthen our local communities and contribute to the economic sustainability of the region. Our efforts to support local businesses take on a new significance this year, and

we know that shopping local is going to be more important than ever before this holiday season. The small businesses that help define our local communities continue to face hardships as the pandemic goes on, and it threatens to exacerbate the trend towards online shopping and consolidation among many of these industries. However, there could also be opportunities for our local businesses and the regional economy as supply chain disruptions exposed by the pandemic may encourage consumers and businesses to look to local suppliers and local businesses to help them fulfill their needs.

Since the pandemic began, the Chamber has been focused on providing guidance, resources and a support system to help businesses get through the crisis. Recognizing the importance, the Chamber has developed several marketing campaigns to support small businesses and encourage consumers to shop, eat and visit locally. We have developed new locally focused content, new messaging and we are utilizing digital and social media channels to promote, connect and engage with consumers. The Chamber has also been utilizing its "Gift Local" gift card initiative to encourage shopping local. With nearly 50 businesses currently participating, consumers are given a choice when deciding on where and how they want to spend their money.

"Our restaurants, hotels and local retailers are among the hardest hit by the pandemic. These businesses are finding innovative ways to adapt, transform and survive," said Roy M. Nascimento, President & CEO of the North Central

Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "We want to encourage people to support local businesses whenever they can. These business owners are working hard to keep their doors open, create jobs, and fill needs in our community and deserve our support"

The state has also stepped up with a new awareness campaign entitled "My Local MA" to encourage consumers to support local businesses. The Chamber has embraced the effort and is supporting the campaign.

"The My Local MA campaign reminds Massachusetts residents that where they shop, dine and travel matters," said

Spending locally keeps people employed and keeps Main Streets and small businesses thriving in our 351 cities and towns. We want people to stay safe and put their money where their heart is - right here in Massachusetts."

Why is this important? A recent survey conducted by the Chamber shows that 64% of the small businesses reported losses when compared to 2019, with nearly 27% reporting losses of 50% or more. Nearly 60% also reported that they expect it will be more than six months before their operations return to normal. Twenty-five percent of respondents also estimated they could stay operational on current cash flow and reserves for just six months or less. The survey also showed that marketing to reach their customers was the most requested resource when asked what resources, beyond financial assistance, would be most helpful.

It's no secret that local small businesses have a tremendous impact on our local economy. When you buy goods and services from local businesses and merchants, the money you spend stays in our communities. National research shows that for every \$100 spent at a locally owned business, \$48 stays in our cities and towns. That's compared to only \$14 of \$100 that is spent at a chain and just \$1 when spent at large e-commerce retailers. Those dollars support the essential services that we all rely on, including police, fire, schools, streets and more.

Local and independent small businesses are also more likely to give back to the community, create more jobs and opportunities, and support other area small businesses. They are often the first to step up when teams need sponsors and fundraisers need venues or goods. Small businesses also work hard to keep your trust each and every day, providing unparalleled products and services. All of this helps to strengthen our communities and contributes to our quality of life.

With the holiday season before us, there is no doubt that consumers are all thinking about shopping and the gifts they want to buy for the people in their lives. With busy schedules and the pandemic, it's easy to consider turning to the internet to get shopping done. But that type of shopping has consequences

on the local community. This winter is expected to be a difficult one for many small businesses, the Chamber will be encouraging everyone to consider local businesses when making their buying decision. Not only does this support local businesses, but it has profound rewards for the community.  $\Diamond$

#### CHAMBER LAUNCHING NEW PODCAST SERIES

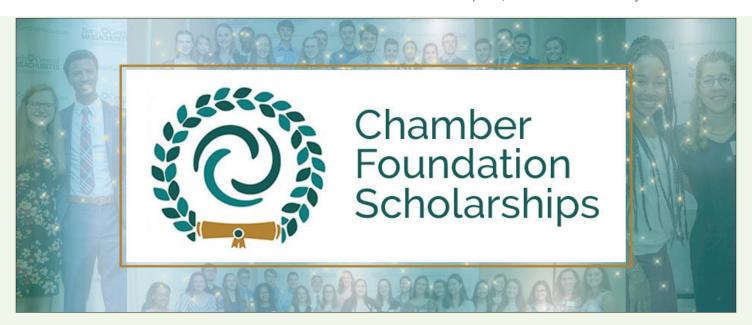

Applications for the 2021 scholarship program through the North Central Massachusetts Chamber Foundation will be accepted starting February 1, 2021. Students interested in applying for a scholarship through the Chamber's Foundation should contact their high school guidance department to submit an application. Each year, the Chamber Foundation distributes approximately 25 scholarships to local high-achieving high school students in North Central Massachusetts. A limited number of applicants are submitted by each school in the Chamber's service area each year and for consideration by a committee of Chamber members. Deadline for applications is Monday, March 1, 2021.

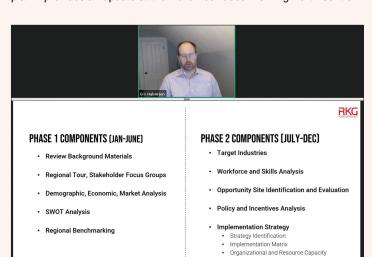

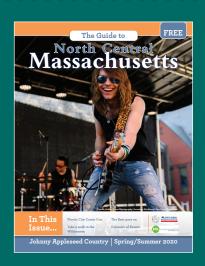
