CHAMBER INSTALLS WELCOME SIGN IN GARDNER

Part of regional effort to boost civic pride and create positive first impression

The North Central Massachusetts Chamber sponsored the construction of a new welcome sign for the City of Gardner on Route 140 between the Route 2 Exit 90B off ramp and Mount Wachusett Community College.

The new sign is part of an ongoing project to construct welcoming signs at key gateways in communities throughout the region to boost civic pride and serve as a positive first impression for visitors.

The Gardner welcome sign includes a carving of the City of Gardner seal and is painted in the proud city color of blue and gold. In addition to Gardner, similar welcome signs have been installed at key gateways in Fitchburg, Leominster, Sterling and Westminster, with additional signs planned for Hubbardston, Lunenburg and Pepperell. The signs represent the region's traditional New England style. Each sign is carved with the community's seal

and painted to match their official colors. Additional signs will be constructed for other communities in North Central Massachusetts as funding becomes available.

"One of the goals of our regional economic redevelopment plan, *One North Central*, was to capitalize on our region's unique locations," said Roy Nascimento, President and CEO, North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "Each city brings a distinctive experience to the

region and with this project, those entering Gardner will learn about the city while receiving a warm welcome as they arrive."

"Whether we are welcoming residents home or visitors to the Furniture Capital of New England, we are proud of our rich history here in Gardner and grateful to the Chamber for offering to install the sign as a way to share our legacy with those who travel on one of our gateway roads," said Mayor Michael Nicholson, City of Gardner. \Diamond

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS UPDATE

A number of state and local officials from member communities were also present for the announcement.

FEDERAL AFFAIRS:

We are currently monitoring the bipartisan Building Chips in America Act of 2023 which aims to enhance the CHIPS Act passed in 2022 and increase efforts to bring microchip manufacturing back to the U.S. The Chamber is also working to engage our Washington D.C. representation on a pair of bills, H.R. 2673 American Innovation and **R&D** Competitiveness Act of 2023 and its Senate counterpart, S.866 American Innovation and Jobs Act. This pair of bills aims to course correct a provision in the 2017 Tax Cuts and jobs Act that set a sunset date of 2022 for a provision in the Tax Code that allowed firms to recognize all Research

and Development (R&D) expenditures in the year that they were incurred. Members of our Washington D.C. fly-in had the opportunity to discuss the impact of this legislation on their business and this continues to be a concern.

We are proud to announce that our Annual Congressional Luncheon is scheduled for November 1, 2023. Congressman Jim McGovern and Congresswoman Lori Trahan are confirmed again to participate in this popular forum for members to connect with our Congressional delegation and get insight into priorities on Capitol Hill. We would like to thank Fitchburg State University for their continued sponsorship of the luncheon program.

STATE AFFAIRS:

The Executive Office of Economic Development continued their series of listening sessions across the state over the Summer as part of their economic development planning process. As reported in our last issue, members of the Chamber team and our various partners in the region attended a listening session held at WPI. Since then, we also had the opportunity to provide input at sessions held at Framingham State University, the Fitchburg Legislative Building and online. We provided input across a number of areas that align with our public

policy agenda including small business supports, economic development, workforce development, and transportation.

Governor Healey signed the FY2024 State Budget on August 9. The \$56 billion budget sees an increase of approximately 6.2% compared to the fiscal year 2023 budget. The Chamber was pleased to see continued funding in the budget for several regional economic development priorities. On the tourism front, the budget included an additional \$1 million for the Tourism Trust Fund and an additional \$3 million for the Massachusetts Office of Travel & Tourism (MOTT) for tourism and

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hospitality recovery. The additional investments in tourism were supported by the Chamber as we believe they are crucial for the continued promotion of the state and the North Central Massachusetts region. We were also pleased to see that funding for early college saw a \$9 million increase over last year's budget and funding for innovation pathways saw a \$1 million increase. A new line item also allocates \$5 million for equitable scaling of

pathway programs. The Student Opportunity Act is once again fully funded and the State will launch its MassReconnect to support getting residents 25 or older into community college programs.

The Chamber participated in a virtual discussion with MassDOT officials and stakeholders from across the Commonwealth as they discussed their plans for potential rail expansion along the Northern Tier corridor. Not only would this investment bring more visitor dollars to the area, but

it has potential to greatly help with workforce challenges involving transportation.


ELECTIONS:

In local affairs, two of the region's three mayors face contested elections later this fall. A number of City Council seats across the three cities will also see contested races. On the State level, the seat left vacant by former Senator Anne Gobi when she joined Economic Secretary Yvonne Hao's team is up for grabs with multiple candidates vying for the seat including two current state

representatives. Once again, we will be gathering our current elected officials and candidates together for our Legislative and Candidates Reception. This is one of our most exciting events of the year and provides members of the community with the opportunity to engage our elected officials and those looking to hold office. This year's event is sponsored by Mount Wachusett Community College and will be held at the Chocksett Inn in Sterling on Thursday, September 21 from 5:00 to 7:00 PM. ◊

The North Central Massachusetts Chamber Board of Directors Celebrate Following the Announcement of the Chamber Receiving 5-Star Accreditation.

CHAMBER RECEIVES 5-STAR ACCREDITATION

he North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce has been awarded a 5-star Accreditation as a result of its sound policies, effective organizational procedures, and positive impact on the community by the Accrediting Board of the United States Chamber of Commerce. The announcement was made to an audience of nearly 300 business and community leaders at the Chamber's Annual Business Meeting on June 15, 2023.

Accreditation is the only national program to recognize chambers of commerce for their effective organizational procedures and community involvement. In order to achieve this recognition, a chamber must meet minimum standards in their operations and programs, including areas of governance, government affairs, communications and technology. This

comprehensive self-review was conducted over a four-month period and required preparation of an extensive application, including compilation and review of volumes of materials required by the Accrediting Board, and demonstration of competency in nine core areas ranging from finance to facilities.

Of the approximately 7,000 chambers in the U.S., there are currently only 140 5-Star rated chambers, which represent the top three percent of all chambers in the country. In Massachusetts, the North Central Massachusetts Chamber is one of only two chambers with this prestigious accreditation.

"When chambers of commerce earn the distinction of becoming accredited, it is a mark of excellence for the organization, its staff, and its leadership" said Raymond P. Towle, U.S. Chamber vice president, Federation Relations and Institute for Organization Management. "This rigorous

review includes all aspects of a chamber's policies, operations, and programming. Accredited chambers are recognized for their continued advocacy of free enterprise, and for their commitment to serving members and their local business communities. Congratulations on this tremendous accomplishment."

"We are incredibly honored to receive this national designation which places us among the best chambers of commerce in the country," said Roy M. Nascimento, president & CEO, North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "We challenged ourselves to improve our Chamber for the betterment of our members and our region. Receiving this accreditation only motivates us to continue to remain engaged, active and innovative on behalf of our members and communities in North Central Massachusetts."

Local chambers are rated Accredited, 3-Stars, 4-Stars,

or 5-Stars. State chambers are recognized as either Accredited State Chamber or Accredited State Chamber with Distinction. The final determination is made by the Accrediting Board.

The accreditation report noted the North Central Massachusetts Chamber has demonstrated an excellent track record of operating a successful chamber and achieving desirable results for its members. Several of the Chamber's programs, events and initiatives were highlighted for special recognition, including its leadership role in helping members and the community navigate the COVID-19 pandemic, and the Chamber's leadership in talent and workforce development. The Chamber also received special recognition for its thoughtful and impactful efforts around government affairs and volunteer recognition, and for investments it has made in technology. ◊

LOCAL SUPPORTING LOCAL: ECI STORES TO CELEBRATE 25 YEARS IN BUSINESS

When it comes to supporting the local community, you can look no further than Cassandra and Neil Abramson, owners of ECI Stores, who will be celebrating 25 years in business in October later this year.

ECI Stores is the parent company of four local consignment shops in Leominster, Ma: Cutie Patuties, CP & Company, Cutiques, and Q for Teens. Established in October 1998, ECI Stores has grown into four locations that are conveniently right near each other.

"You can do all of your shopping in one day!" Abramson said.

Cutie Patuties specializes in gently used items, sized for newborns to preteens, which can be anything from clothing, toys, and baby equipment like strollers. Q for Teens is everything you can imagine that's fashionable for a teenager and young adult, including clothing, bags, shoes, accessories, and more. According to the website, "Q is You! Q can be whatever style your young adult is all about: retro, vintage, hip, modern, romantic, or rustic we've got it all!"

CP & Company provides a large selection of misses, petites, and plus size clothing for women and adults, which also includes bags, accessories, clothing, and more. Cutiques just recently celebrated their 10-year anniversary with their ribbon cutting this past March 2023. This division of consignment focuses on home décor and furniture, with

everything from a kitchen table to lamps and lighting, wall hangings and more.

"One of the things that we really try to do is community involvement," Abramson said. "More than most businesses, your local consignment store is your community, because next. She decided right then and there that she was going to open her own store instead.

"I went to the car to call my husband and said, 'I'm opening a consignment store!"

As their child grew, her needs grew and expanded

that's how we source our inventory – there's no truck pulling up that has inventory in it. It all comes in from your neighbors: things that they've outgrown, things that they don't need, and things that they are ready to move on from. It's all community driven."

When their daughter was approximately six months old, Abramson would visit her favorite consignment shop in Worcester and do all her shopping there for her newborn, until one day, that shop decided to go out of business. Disheartened, Abramson thought about where she was going to shop

into the next size range, ECI Stores also expanded into the next steps: teen clothing, shoes, accessories, and more to what you see today.

With a focus on local, consignment stores live and breathe from the local community. Everything that you see in consignment stores is brought in by neighbors, family, and friends who have outgrown the item. These items could be useful for someone else and their family.

"We price it, make descriptions, put it on our website, and we can even ship directly to you if needed," Abramson said. "There's hardly any other business, especially a small business, that has about 3,500 unique, individual items on the website."

And although it may be a lot of work, the Abramsons make it look easy, especially since after the COVID-19 pandemic nearly three years ago.

"We've been doing more online since the pandemic. It really provided us the time and necessity to be able to focus back on the business," she said. "Businesses had the opportunity to either shut down and wait, or use the time productively and say, 'what can we do for after?' And that's what we did, every single day."

Abramson now provides online sales through their website, as well as Facebook and social media sales. "We reach our customers however they need it."

Being able to think on their feet and find a solution for not just themselves, but for their customers as well is what makes ECI Stores unique, and providing sales online shows diversity in what they can offer as a consignment store.

"We try to keep everything locally driven – insurance, banking, office supplies, coffee...you name it. We do everything we can to support the North Central area and support local businesses," she said.

As a long time member of the North Central Massachusetts Chamber, ECI Stores loves the ongoing educational opportunities. The North Central

SMALL BUSINESS ENERGY RELIEF GRANT PROGRAM:

The Chamber is offering one-time energy grants of \$1,000 to small businesses to help to off-set high energy prices and financial obstacles. Thank you to National Grid for contributing \$100,000 to the Chamber to help make this grant program possible. Since launching the grant in July, we have already awarded \$49,000 in grants to 49 small businesses. There are still grants available, so we encourage members to reach out to us to see if they are eligible. We are prioritizing chamber members for the grants.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT:

In August, Travis Condon, the Chamber's public affairs manager, and Kat Deal, the Chamber's programs & events manager, completed their second year of the US Chamber's Northeast Institute for Organization Management (IOM). IOM is a four-year national professional development program geared towards chamber of commerce and

association professionals. Participants complete a week-long intensive session each year taught by university professors, industry experts, and leading practitioners in the chamber industry. Courses included advocacy, media training, membership, finance, legal issues, human resources to name just a few. They also had an opportunity to reconnect with other Chamber and Association professionals from all over the country.

ACCE CONVENTION:

Chamber President & CEO Roy Nascimento was invited to present at the Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives National Convention in Salt Lake City in August. He spoke at two sessions titled "Data-Driven Workforce & Economic Growth Strategies" and "Overcoming Barriers to Upskilling Workers" where

he shared our experiences and efforts with chamber and economic development leaders from throughout the country.

NASCIMENTO ELECTED TO ACCE FOUNDATION:

Chamber president & CEO Roy Nascimento was elected recently to serve on the board of directors for the ACCE Foundation, a 501(c)3 that supports the work of the Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives. ACCE's Foundation was established to fund programming, peer-to-peer learning, and leadership development for chamber professionals seeking to create positive change by addressing the issues that challenge the long-term economic health and quality of life in our country's cities and towns. Directors bring their knowledge and expertise to help the ACCE Foundation understand industry trends and the needs of members working in the priority areas of the Foundation. Those include education and talent; diversity, equity and inclusion; and economic and community development.

WEBSITE: The Chamber has started a project to redesign the Chamber website to make it a more dynamic and valuable resource for our members and communities. As part of the process, we plan to consolidate our Chamber website northcentralmass.com - and our economic development website - choosenorthcentral. com – to make it easier to manage and avoid duplication. We also recently completed a homepage

redesign of our tourism website – visitnorthcentral. com. We are excited about the project and look forward to launching the redesigned site in the coming months!

ONLINE TRAINING:

In conjunction with the Chamber website redesign project, we are also launching a new online training platform called Initiate. Initiate is a comprehensive online training resource that will be integrated with our redesigned website and offers several modules around starting a business, marketing, operations, bookkeeping and more that many small businesses need.

NEW LOANS: The North Central Massachusetts Development Corporation (NCMDC), the Chamber's economic development arm, has approved and closed on a total of twenty-three small business loans totaling \$1,145,000 to date for FY23. The smallest loan was just \$5,000 while the largest was \$216,000. Our loans helped to leverage an additional \$1,066,579 in capital from banks, public entities and from the borrowers. The majority of the loans helped fund start-up businesses as well as some existing small businesses that were expanding. Two of the loans were made under our new Regional Business Investment Fund and are helping with real estate development projects in two of our communities that have been prioritized for economic development. These loans resulted in the creation of 63 new jobs and the retention of 35 jobs.

MINI-GRANTS: The

NCMDC continues to offer mini-grants between \$500 - \$5,000 to our borrowers to assist with technical assistance. For FY2023, we have approved a total of ten minigrants totaling \$35,288.93 for bookkeeping, marketing, signage and other professional assistance. Prioritization is given to existing loan clients but we will consider other small businesses in North Central Massachusetts with a demonstrated need.

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE:

Our economic development team has provided a total of 2052 hours of direct technical assistance to existing and startup businesses in the region. During the last quarter, our team also worked with the Massachusetts Export Center to help several businesses with questions around certificates of origin. In addition, the Small Business Development Center at Clark University has resumed holding office hours at the Chamber to help support start-ups and expanding small businesses in the region.

NORTH CENTRAL

COMPACT: In June, the members of the Compact met again to continue to explore

collaborative strategies to the workforce challenges in the region. The North Central Talent Compact is a collective impact coalition convened by the Chamber and other major stakeholders to address the complex talent and workforce challenges facing the region. The group consists of a group of prominent business, education, workforce and community leaders who are committed to collective action and leadership. An outgrowth of the Compact meeting is an expanded Career and Hiring Event in October, with more schools participating and bringing students to connect with employers to learn about available careers.

LATINX OUTREACH: The

Chamber and NCMDC continue to prioritize efforts to engage more with Latinx business owners/ entrepreneurs and connect them with financial resources, programs and business networks. Latinos are the largest minority group in the region and increasingly playing a larger role in our economy. We are currently in the process of interviewing candidates for the bi-lingual Community Business Advisor role to help with these efforts.

poperate: We continue to trend upwards with our Inside North Central podcast series. Over the last year we have had 2,549 plays on the major podcast services, which reflects a 300% increase over the previous year. Our podcasts are currently available on Apple Podcasts, Spotify, Podbean, and Google. Thank you to all the members who have participated in interviews

and/or listened to the new Podcast series.

SOLAR: From its inception in August 2014 through July 2023 the solar field on Pleasant St. has produced 12,843,986 kWh of Net Metering Credits to the manufacturers participating in the program. Total value of these credits is \$3,015,926 and the collective savings to participants totals \$2,563,537. As one of the participants, the Chamber has received \$241,274 in energy savings to-date.

CHAMBER GIFT CARDS:

In preparation for the upcoming holiday season, we encourage member merchants interested in accepting the new revamped Gift Local E-Gift Cards to contact the Chamber. We are approaching the oneyear anniversary since the transition to the new platform for processing the gift cards. Feedback from participating members and gift card recipients has been positive so far. There is no charge to participate and the new cards are easy to process via the Mastercard network, however participating merchants must run an activation card from the Chamber in order to be able to accept the cards. ◊

Chamber of the Year is the most prestigious and competitive award in the chamber industry and recognizes chambers that demonstrate excellence in operations, member services and community leadership. Based in Alexandria, Va., ACCE has more than 1,600 chambers of commerce and related business and economic

The recognition also comes just a few months after the North Central Massachusetts Chamber was awarded five-star accreditation by the Accrediting Board of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce for its operations and initiatives.



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EMERGING LEADERS GRADUATE FROM COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

he Community Leadership Institute (CLI) Class of 2023 were recognized at the Chamber's Annual Meeting held on June 15 at Great Wolf Lodge in Fitchburg.

Nineteen graduates, who were identified as up-and-coming leaders in the region, completed the nine-month program which is focused on providing participants with individual leadership skills, a stronger understanding of the region, and deeper connections to business and community leaders.

"The Chamber developed CLI to inspire a new generation of community leaders to enthusiastically assume important roles in their community while motivating participants from diverse backgrounds to be influential in our region's future," said Roy

M. Nascimento, president and CEO, North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce.

Mike Greenwood, Ph.D., professor of business at Fitchburg State University and chairman of the CLI Steering Committee, was impressed by the caliber of this year's class. "Each year, I continue to be amazed with the dedication, creativity and motivation of our participants," said Dr. Greenwood. "Programs like CLI are important to our community in an effort to ensure a continuity of leadership, community engagement and service as our region's current leaders look forward to retirement."

The nine-month CLI program traditionally runs from October to June and includes an orientation and eight day-long sessions on

various topic areas, including Personal Leadership; Non-Profit Governance/ Volunteerism; History of the Region; Media & Crisis Communications; Healthcare; Law & Justice; Legislation/Public Policy; Arts & Culture; and Economic Development. In addition, the CLI participants complete a community project through the course of the nine-month program. Participants select a project, or break into smaller groups of similar interest, with a goal to positively affect the community while also managing and executing the project before the end of the program year. The program culminates with a commencement ceremony at the Chamber's Annual Meeting where the class and their service projects are recognized.

"The service project aspect of the curriculum is my favorite part of the CLI program," said Kat Deal, programs & events manager, North Central Massachusetts Chamber of Commerce. "I am always inspired and amazed by the incredible projects that come out of each CLI class. Past CLI projects have included the creation of a new non-profit organization to help with holiday gifts for families dealing with cancer to a project designed to help improve the appearance of a downtown business district in order to support future business development and community inclusion."

This year's class worked on three service projects, including the establishment



CLI NON-TRADITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

of a "Wash it Forward" program and a non-traditional scholarship program for students.

Wash it Forward provided an opportunity for the homeless individuals in the region to wash and dry their laundry for free at area laundromats with detergent and dryer sheets provided by the generosity of CLI participants. Wash and Fold in Leominster hosted an event, with pizza donated by Papou's Pizza, while Laundry World in Fitchburg also hosted a Wash it Forward event that also provided access to a food pantry led by the owner of Laundry World.

"Wash it Forward was

a fantastic success that helped many people," said Ryan May, head teller at Avidia Bank and 2023 CLI graduate. "I hope this inspires people to continue to do this, even if it isn't for an event, but just to help someone who needs a hand."

Patrick Ellis, senior branch manager, vice president, Enterprise Bank & Trust and 2023 CLI graduate said, "We were looking for a grassroots project that would have a real impact on real people. And everyone has to do laundry!"

This year's class also developed a non-traditional scholarship program which provided seven individuals with a \$2,000 scholarship

each to help bridge the financial gap to attend programs in cosmetology, electrical engineering, licensed practical nursing, human services, or toward tuition to attend a community college or four-year university. The CLI Class partnered with My Turn to deliver the scholarships. My Turn is an organization that helps people develop their skills, goals and self-confidence through alternative education, post-secondary planning, career exploration and employment training. As an outgrowth of the CLI project, the North Central Massachusetts Chamber

Foundation hopes to continue to provide non-traditional scholarships to students who may not qualify for traditional scholarships or other funding opportunities.

The Community
Leadership Institute began
in 1988, known then as
Leadership North Central.
Over the last 25 years,
more than 250 participants
have graduated from the
Institute and become leaders
in their communities, with
over 100 in the last five
years. Participants for the
Institute are sponsored by
their business and are seen
as leaders or potential leaders
within that company. ◊

TOURSMupdate

The Chamber's destination marketing arm, Visit North Central Massachusetts (VNCM), ended its fiscal year on June 30, 2023. Here is a recap of efforts.

Branding & Advertising

Throughout the year we promoted the region with a blend of print and digital advertising strategies across our targeted markets. The creative messaging for these ads focused on "Everything You Love About New England... A Lot Closer to Home" and highlighted each of the four seasons. To achieve this, we focused on developing fresh and engaging content for our website. This included creating captivating Spring/ **Summer Blog Articles** as well as compiling a comprehensive listing of upcoming events. To attract more visitors from the drive market, we implemented a range of strategies combining both print and digital advertising. We invested in paid social media campaigns to reach a wider audience

through MassLive; employed targeted and geofenced digital advertising to maximize our outreach through Cumulus; utilized paid Search Engine Marketing techniques to improve our online visibility through Local IQ; and updated a large-format display at Logan Airport. We also utilized print/digital campaigns through AAA and Yankee Magazine; custom content listings and emails through Visit New England; and listings in Trip Advisor. All these efforts were carefully crafted to effectively showcase the diverse attractions and offerings of our region and to increase web traffic. By utilizing a combination of print and digital platforms, we aimed to captivate potential visitors and encourage them to explore the unique experiences available in North Central Massachusetts.

Visitor Guide

We also published the Spring/Summer edition of the Guide to North Central Massachusetts to showcase the region as a unique destination for living, working, and visiting. We increased our printing from 35,000 copies in 2022 to 40,000 copies per edition and also increased distribution from 300 to 350 high-traffic locations throughout New England. A digital version is also shared on our website, social media, via email, and shared with the Massachusetts Office of Travel & Tourism (MOTT) to maximize its reach and engagement. Thank you to all the members who advertised in the Guide. Anyone interested in advertising in the next edition should contact Diane Burnette at dburnette@ northcentralmass.com.

FAM Trips & Travel Shows

We continued to actively participate in FAM Trips & Travel Shows to promote the region. During the year, we collaborated with our partners to host several familiarization tours for group tour operators, travel writers and social media influencers. We also participated in several tourism related travel

events and responded to inquiries from event organizers interested in the region.

Social Media & Website

We continued to be very active on social media. From January to June, Visit North Central Massachusetts' Facebook page had an impressive organic reach of 427,645, attracting 6,811 new followers. In addition to the organic reach, the page also utilized paid promotion with an additional reach of 295,246 and 1,184,710 paid impressions. On Instagram, the page achieved an organic reach of 12,278 and gained 429 new followers during the second half of the year. Google analytics indicates we also saw a 119.20% increase in visitors to our website for FY23. During the same time period we also had over 802,067 google impressions.

Lodging & Visitor Data

Tourism indicators for the region continue to be very strong. STR data indicates that hotel occupancy YTD

through June was 71.7%, a 3.5% increase over the previous year; ADR was \$191.17 which is a 9.5% increase: RevPar was \$137.05, a 13.3% increase over the previous year; total room revenue was up 13.3%; and rooms sold was up 3.5%. AirDNA data also showed that the supply of short-term rentals (vacation rentals) in the region increased from 144 in 2022 to 229 in 2023 through June. Occupancy through June of short-term rentals was 58%. a decrease of 6.7% over the prior year, and average daily rate (ADR) was \$235, an 18.4% increase over the prior year. RevPar was \$136, a 10.5% increase over the prior year. Economic impact data recently released for CY2022 by the state indicates that direct visitor spending jumped 39% to \$184.9 million in the region, which brings the region back up to pre-pandemic visitor spending levels. Local tax receipts also increased by 85% to \$6.1 million for CY2022.

What's Next?

Our team is currently working to finalize the Fall edition of the Guide to North Central Massachusetts and to develop our new marketing plan to present to the Board of Directors and MOTT for approval. We will also be launching a redesigned home page for visitnorthcentral. com soon and are introducing a new series of cultural performances/ demonstrations in the Fall at the Johnny **Appleseed Visitor** Center to highlight local culture and attractions in the region. In partnership with two other Regional Tourism Councils, we are working to implement the off season marketing campaign funded from the recent federal economic development grant. We are also making plans to once again participate in the Big E and are actively working to host additional familiarization trips with travel influencers. \Diamond


